introduction

For the past few years, I have watched my colleagues in the dog photography world get caught up in photographing adoptable shelter animals—and what a great trend to be caught up in! It is incredibly generous and hugely important work. It also tips the balance to survival for so many animals. But what I feel is missing from that trend is a wider view of the shelter system—one that incorporates the human aspect of shelter work. Without the volunteers, our nation's animal shelters simply would not function.

Shelter volunteers are amazing people. They are selfless, dedicated, and deeply attached to their cause. They are looking to give their love to something outside of themselves and in return receive the powerful, unspoken love of a shelter dog. Though rarely discussed within the animal welfare system, volunteers find an environment of support and friendship in their relationships with these animals, making the shelter a place for humans and animals to heal together. Finding Shelter gives volunteers an opportunity to tell their own stories, in their own words—all of which focus on how healing and joyful this work truly is.

I started this project in the beginning of 2014 and spent a year driving up and down the California coast on my own dime, convincing shelters and rescue groups that I had a story to tell and that they could trust me. As an artist
