

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Jean's Early Life

Jean Paget was born in Malaya, in 1921. At that time Malaya was ruled by the British and many people from Britain lived and worked in Malaya. Some of them were government officers, others were in the army and the police force, and others worked in schools and hospitals. But most British people in Malaya worked in trade and industry. The most important industries were mining tin and growing rubber.

Jean Paget's father was the manager of a large rubber estate¹. The estate was in the State of Perak, about 100 miles north of the

capital city, Kuala Lumpur.

Mr Paget lived on the rubber estate with his wife and family. There were two children, a boy called Donald and a girl called

Jean. Donald was three years older than Jean.

When the children were very small, they were looked after by an amah². This amah was a Malay woman and she spoke to them in Malay. And so the children learned to speak both Malay

and English.

At first, Mrs Paget taught the children herself. But when Donald was thirteen, he had to go to school in England. Jean was only ten at that time, but she went back to England as well. The two children went to stay with their grandparents near Southampton, a large town about eighty miles from London.

Two years later, the grandparents became ill and Mrs Paget had to go back to England. She bought a small house in South-

ampton and lived there with the children.

When Jean was thirteen, her father was killed in a car accident. He had gone to Kuala Lumpur to do some business and it was late at night when he set out on his journey home.
