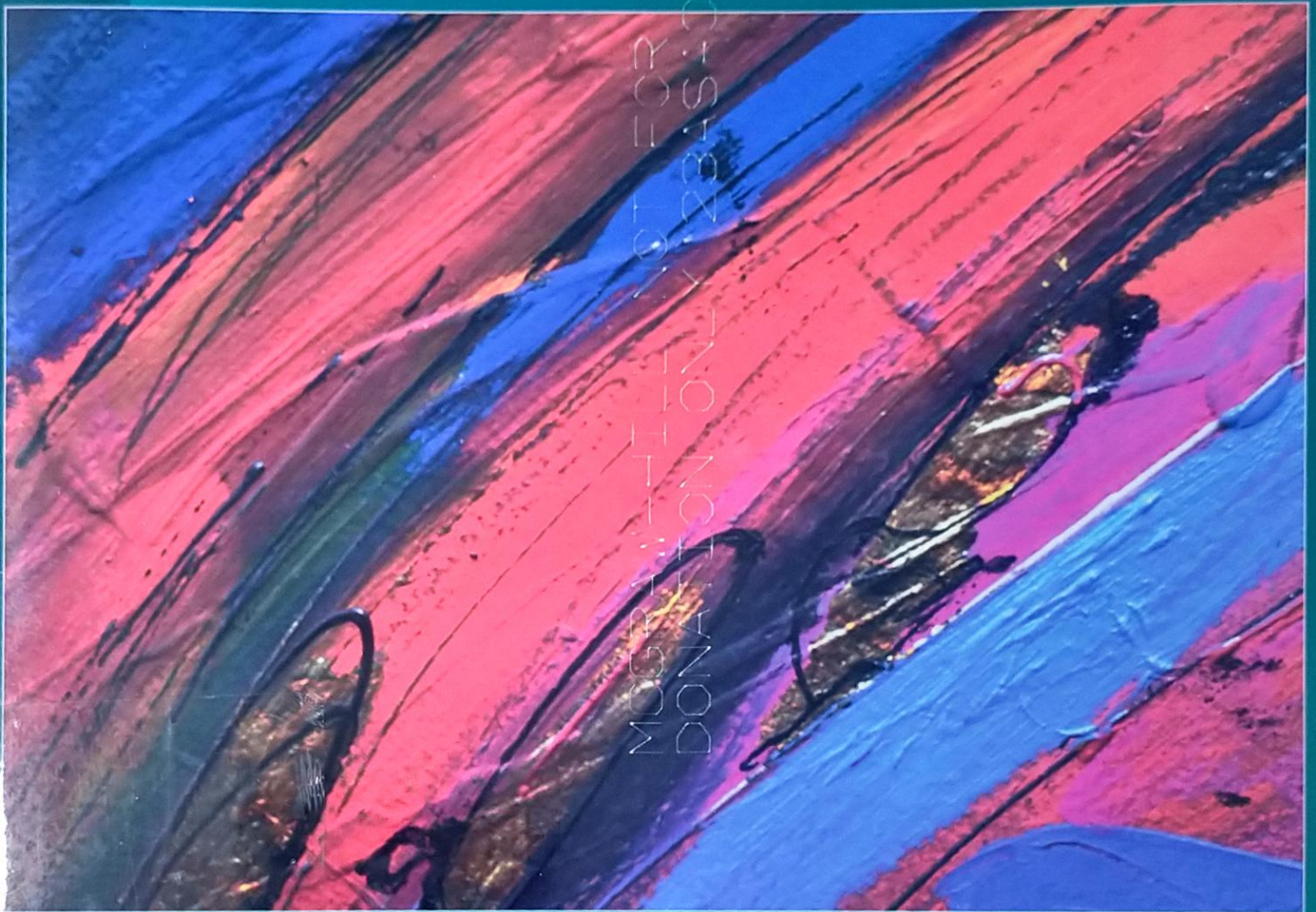

### Did You Know?

- The first people to reach the South Pole were five Norwegian men led by Captain Roald Amundsen on December 4, 1911. They traveled 55 days by dog sled to get there.
- The first people to reach the North Pole were three Russian explorers who arrived and departed by air on April 23, 1968.
- The north and south polar regions balance the flow of air and water for the entire planet. Without this balance, we would face catastrophic floods and droughts (dry periods) that would change the face of the earth. In fact, if enough ice at the poles melts, an island desert such as the one surrounding Las Vegas, Nevada, might eventually become beachfront property.
