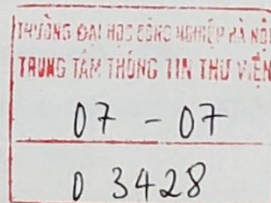
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Preface

This book is designed for use as a one-semester course in accounting information systems at either the college level or graduate level. Introductory financial and managerial accounting courses are suggested prerequisites, and an introductory information systems course that covers development packages or software packages is helpful, but not necessary.

The book can also be used in the training of graduates or advanced undergraduate management information systems majors.

The book focuses on the most prevalent information systems auditing with a solid understanding of accounting and auditing systems. Students can then build on as they pursue their own special interests in topics such as databases, data warehouses and data mining, data security, systems analysis, and systems development, implementation, computer security, and information management systems.

As with previous editions, the primary focus of the fifteenth edition is on the development of the accounting information systems and the role of the accountant in the development of the accounting information systems.

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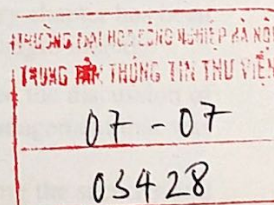
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
